Each year this award is given to farmers who show tremendous amounts of work being done to help preserve and improve the soil and water quality in the area. Bill is a great inspiration for all farmers in Ripley County.

CRP Mid-Contract Management

Be sure to check your CRP contract to see when your mid-managements are due.

Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) policy requires newly enrolled participants, starting with Signup 26, to do some type of "disturbance" to certain CRP practices during the life of the contract to benefit wildlife. Normally, mid-contract management activities are conducted between the 4th and 7th year of the contract. However, on land with existing cover, disturbance activities can begin as soon as technically feasible.

These are some mid-management options:

Strip Disking:

The disking operations will result in strips having 40%-70% bare soil, equally distributed throughout the area of disturbance.

Disked strips will be a maximum of 50 feet wide. Alternate disked strips with undisturbed areas 2-4 times the width (100-200 feet) of disturbed strip.

Inter-Seeding Forbs & Legumes:

Forb and legume mixes will consist of a total of ½ to 1 lb. per acre, and will contain a minimum of five species in approximately equal proportions. Inter-seeded strips will be a maximum of 50 feet wide. Alternate inter-seeded strips with undisturbed areas 2-4 times the width (100-200 feet) of the seeded strip.

Strip Spraying:

Strips will not be sprayed more than once in a two-year period.

Sprayed strips will be a maximum of 50 feet wide. Alternate Spray strips with undisturbed areas 2-4 times the width (100-200 feet) of the disturbed strip. Strip spraying operations will be performed along field contours, or across the slope, when practical.

Prescribed Burning:

A written prescribed burn plan must be completed before any fires are started.

Rotate fields through a 3-year burning cycle. When prescribed burning is used it will result in a seedbed that consists of 40-70% bare soil.

FSA County Committee Elections

The period to nominate candidates for the upcoming county committee election **is closed**. Nominations were due in the county office on **Friday, Aug. 1**. Ballots will be mailed to all eligible voters **by Nov. 3**. Voted ballots must be returned to the county office **by Dec. 1** or postmarked by midnight Dec. 1, 2008.

County committee elections give farmers and producers an important opportunity to ensure that their FSA county committees represent them. Farmers and producers who serve on county committees help make decisions necessary to administer federal farm programs offered in their communities. County committees make decisions on agricultural issues such as; commodity price support loans and payments, conservation programs, disaster payments and employing County Executive Directors.

Agricultural producers of legal voting age can vote if they participate or cooperate in any FSA program. A person who is not of legal voting age but supervises and conducts the farming operations on an entire farm can also vote. No one can be denied the right to vote because of race, color, national origin, sex, religion, age, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation or marital or family status.

- Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters **by Nov. 3**. The last day to return voted ballots to the county office is **Dec. 1**.
- Newly elected county committee members take office **Jan. 1, 2009**.

Buy-In Waiver for Supplemental Disaster Assistance

Producers can establish 2008 eligibility for the new disaster assistance programs by paying the applicable administrative fee as required by the Food, Conservation and Energy Act of 2008 (the 2008 Act).

Ordinarily producers who wish to participate in the new disaster programs would need crop insurance or non-insured crop disaster assistance (NAP) coverage on all farms in all counties in which they have an interest. Since the 2008 Act was enacted after the application periods had closed for those programs, producers who did not have insurance coverage could not comply with this requirement in order to be eligible. However, the 2008 Act authorizes a waiver that allows producers to pay a fee, called a "buy-in" fee, to be eligible for the new disaster assistance programs.

The buy-in fee is due no later than Sept. 16, 2008, 90 days after the date of enactment, as required by the 2008 Act. Payment of the applicable fees will allow the producer to be eligible for financial assistance under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE), Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees and Farm-Raised Fish (EALHF), or Tree Assistance Program (TAP). Those who miss this opportunity will **not** be eligible for 2008 disaster assistance. Producers are also reminded that the payment of the applicable buy-in fee does **not** provide the producer crop insurance or NAP coverage; it only affords eligibility for the 2008 disaster programs.

The buy-in fee for 2008 eligibility is \$100 per crop, but not more than \$300 per producer per administrative county, or \$900 total per producer for all counties less any previously paid fees for CAT and/or NAP. Producers can contact their local administrative FSA county office to get more information or pay applicable fees **by September 16, 2008**.

FSA Marketing Assistance Loans and LDPs

To be eligible for Marketing Assistance Loans and Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP), you must comply with conservation and wetland protection requirements; report how you use cropland acreage on the farm; have beneficial interest in the commodity on the date the loan or LDP is requested and, in the case of a loan, retain beneficial interest while the loan is outstanding; and ensure that the commodity meets CCC minimum grade and quality standards.

Beneficial interest means you retain the ability to make decisions about the commodity; are responsible for loss or damage to the commodity; and have title to the commodity. Once beneficial interest in a commodity is lost, the commodity is ineligible for loan or LDP – even if you regain beneficial interest.

For commodities to be eligible for loans or LDP's, they must have been produced by an eligible producer, be in existence and in a storable condition and be merchantable for food, feed or other uses as determined by CCC. The quality of the commodity in farm storage must be maintained throughout the term of the loan.

Loans mature 9 months after the month in which they are disbursed. Loans can be issued on commodities as soon as it is harvested. The final date to obtain a loan or LDP on 2007 harvested commodities is March 31, 2009 for small grains and May 29, 2009 for feed grains.

2008 DCP Sign-up Continues

Producers have **until September 30, 2008** to sign-up for the 2008 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP). Producers can fill out their 2008 DCP contract at any USDA Farm Service Agency County Office. Sign-up can also be completed online by going to <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/FSA/edcp> and clicking on "Access eDCP Service." Producers choose payment options, assign crop shares and sign and submit contracts from any computer with Internet access and also view and print submitted contract options. Producers who have not used their eAuth account for 180 days will have inactive accounts. If this happens, producers will need to contact the ITS helpdesk at the following telephone numbers: 1-800-457-3642, then Option 1, to reactivate their account.

FSA computes DCP payments using base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Eligible producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. For 2008, eligible producers may request to receive an advance payment of 22 percent of the direct payment for each commodity associated with the farm. FSA will issue advance direct payments as soon as practical after enrollment. Final direct payments will be issued after Oct. 1, 2008. Counter-cyclical payments vary depending on market prices, and are issued only when the effective price for a commodity is below its target price (which takes into account the direct payment rate, market price and loan rate).

To be eligible for DCP payments, owners, operators, landlords, tenants, or sharecroppers must:

- share in the risk of producing a crop on base acres on a farm enrolled in DCP, and be entitled to share in the crop available for marketing from the base acres or would have shared had a crop been produced;
- annually report the use of the farm's cropland acres;
- comply with conservation and wetland protection requirements on all of their land;
- comply with planting flexibility requirements;
- use the base acres for agricultural or related activities;
- **protect all base acres from erosion, including providing sufficient cover as determined necessary by the county FSA committee, and control weeds.**

Reasonable Accommodations

Reasonable accommodations will be made, upon request, for individuals with disabilities, vision impairment or hearing impairment. If special accommodations are required, please call the Farm Service Agency county office staff, and we will be happy to make any arrangements that are necessary.

NAP Coverage Closing Date Extended

Since the Food, Conservation and Energy Act of 2008 was announced so late about the 2009 risk management purchase requirement for the Supplemental Disaster Programs. The National Farm Service Agency office (FSA) has extended the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) activity for 2009. **As a result, the State Committee established NAP application closing dates that fall before December 1, 2008 have been extended to December 1, 2008, for the 2009 application crop year.**

Please note that extending the 2009 NAP application deadlines to December 1, 2008, does not modify the definition of coverage period. NAP coverage will not begin until the later of the following dates:

- 30 calendar days after the date CCC-471 is filed; and
- The date the crop is planted not to exceed the final planting date.

NAP was designed to reduce financial losses that occur when natural disasters cause a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop by providing coverage equivalent to catastrophic (CAT) insurance. Statute limits NAP to each commercial crop or agricultural commodity, except livestock, for which CAT is not available.

The application deadline date for the 2009 NAP coverage for apples, grapes, hay, honey, nectarines, peaches, strawberries, Christmas trees, & pasture is December 1, 2008. For 2009-2012, the NAP Service Fees have increased from: \$100 to \$250 per crop; \$300 to \$750 per county; \$900 to \$1,875 per producer for all counties.

Producers who already have coverage on 2008 NAP crops may choose to continue coverage on the same crop or crops for 2009, if the applicable service fee is submitted by the application closing date. A new CCC-471, application for coverage is not required to be signed when applying for continuous coverage of the same crop or crops.

Producers who choose to add a new crop(s) or delete a crop(s) from previous year's coverage or changing crop shares must file a new CCC-471 with signatures and pay the applicable service fee.

New Recreational Opportunity Hits Aurora

Studies have shown that benefits are endless when it comes to outdoor recreation; people have better health and qualities of life, crime can be reduced because individuals can expel energy and emotion while performing outdoor activities, property values may increase because there are ample outdoor leisure opportunities, the economy benefits by providing an attraction for tourism, and awareness of the environment is heightened because people are spending more time in nature.

Whether you live, work, or play in Hogan Creeks' picturesque watershed, your enjoyment of its atmosphere, events and opportunities depends a great deal on behind-the-scenes effort. Like you, the Hogan Creek Watershed Project Committee places a high value on the environmental life of our unique, small watershed. That's why they have committed themselves to developing new strategies that will establish the Hogan Creek watershed as a place where people love to be. The newest community project being completed by the Hogan Creek Watershed Project is a non-motorized boat ramp located at Waterways Park in Aurora. In addition to the canoe ramp, a concrete wall was constructed to provide a safe place for shoreline fishing and picnicking.

With generous support from the Dearborn Community Foundation, Dearborn County Convention Visitor and Tourism Bureau, Aurora Casket Company and the Aurora Parks and Recreation Board, the Hogan Creek watershed can add one more recreational opportunity to its list.

This project's goal was to establish a canoe ramp for easy accessibility to Hogan Creek for non-motorized boats by 2008 for citizens living in Aurora and all of Dearborn County. The objectives of this project are to connect people with their watershed by providing safe launching area for canoes, kayaks and other non-motorized boats; increase awareness of environmental and local issues; and encourage residents to take part in community service projects such as beautification days and clean-ups.

The canoe ramp was completed by Howard Excavating, Greendale, on August 11, 2008. While signage, landscaping and a parking lot need to be added to the location, the canoe ramp and fishing wall are ready to be used by the public.
